A Note to Parents & Youth

We are incredibly excited that you are interested in participating in this year's Colorado 4-H State Conference! We trust that you will find it to be an amazing opportunity to grow, learn and meet people from around the state. In the few days we are together, there will be many different ways and opportunities for you to learn new things, make new friends and have a great time on the Colorado State University Campus. It truly is a wonderful pre-college experience, with a lot of hands-on learning and FUN for young people!

Introduction

4-H empowers young people to lead for a lifetime. Through hands-on learning in areas like science, health, agriculture, and citizenship, kids build not only confidence, creativity and curiosity, but also life skills such as leadership and resiliency to help them thrive today and tomorrow.

Colorado 4-H State Conference is an opportunity for 4-H youth ages 14-18 to learn and build these skills. Each year in June, nearly 300 youth from across the state come to the Colorado State University campus in Fort Collins to participate in 4-H contests and workshops, learn new ideas and skills, meet other youth from across the state and experience time on a college campus. The conference engages youth in a positive environment that gives them a chance to explore the CSU campus and interact with CSU Extension staff, CSU faculty, and adult role models from around the state, to spend time investigating potential college programs and careers and to have fun.

OBJECTIVES

Through your participation in Colorado 4-H State Conference you will:

1. **Prepare** to be active in your 4-H club, neighborhood, school and community.
2. **Learn** about various 4-H youth programs.
3. **Experience** "action-learning" in a campus atmosphere.
4. **Strengthen** communication, leadership and other life skills.
5. **Exchange ideas** and **form friendships** with youth and adults from around Colorado.

AUDIENCE

Participation as a delegate of Colorado 4-H State Conference is open to youth ages 14 and over who are involved in Colorado State University Extension programs. While many participants are 4-H club members, many others might not be. This is an opportunity for youth from a wide variety of backgrounds and experiences to come together to exchange ideas, form friendships, and learn important life skills for contributing to their communities.

General Information

NEW THIS YEAR

There are several items that are different or new for this year's conference.

- Livestock/Horse Awards lunch is being replaced with an all-contests Awards Program on Wednesday evening.
- Lodging and registration options are a la carte rather than one registration fee and different lodging packages.
- There is no formal banquet. A breakfast program is being held instead on Thursday morning.
- An array of workshops are being offered on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

HOW TO REGISTER FOR CONFERENCE

After reviewing the information in this handbook, select your lodging, contests and/or workshop choices and write them into the Registration Worksheet (page 18 for youth and page 19 for adults). This will be your reference while registering in 4HOnline. Workshops are filled on a first come, first served basis so for best selection don't delay registration.

Youth and adults register in 4HOnline beginning May 1 ("register for an event" - 2017 State 4-H Conference.) Check with your county Extension office or 4-H agent for your county registration deadline.

Items to note:

If a youth will be participating in a brief contest (such as Parliamentary Procedure or Public Speaking), they will be able to attend workshops as well. Youth is to register and will be charged for the Contest Registration Fee. The youth will also register for the workshop(s) they want to attend, but will not be charged the Workshop Registration Fee.

If a youth will be participating in more than one contest in the same day, they are to register for each contest in which they will participate. They will be charged just **one** Contest Registration Fee.

CANCELLATION POLICY

Promptly notify your County 4-H Agent if you cannot attend. A cancellation in writing received by the State 4-H Office by May 25 will be accepted with no monetary loss to the individual or county. Any cancellation received after May 25 will be accepted but without refund. The individual's full registration fee will be included in the county invoice. Exceptions may be made only in the case of documented illness or family emergency.

ATTENDANCE

Participants are required to attend all Conference activities for which you are registered. After Conference, your County 4-H Agent will receive notice of any activities you missed. A poor attendance record may affect your eligibility to attend future 4-H events.

LODGING

All participants who register for lodging will stay in Summit Hall, a CSU student residence hall. Two delegates of the same gender will occupy a room. Delegates usually room with other youth from their county, but may reside with a delegate from another county in order to fill a room. Bed linens, pillows, blankets and towels are provided.

MEALS

Breakfast is included for participants with lodging and will be at Ram's Horn Dining Center located in Academic Village near Summit Hall. Lunch on Wednesday and Thursday is included in the day registration fee for all participants. Dinners are not provided and are considered "on your own." There are a few dining options available at Lory Student Center. Fort Collins has a wide array of dining choices!

PARKING PERMITS

A parking permit is included for those staying in the residence hall. You will need to provide your license plate information at check in. The permit is only valid in the designated conference lot near the residence hall.

Commuter permits for non-lodging participants to park in the designated conference lot (near the residence hall) are available for pre-purchase at **\$5 per vehicle, per day**. License plate information must be provided prior to receiving your permit. Commuters wishing to park in any other lot on campus may pre-purchase a permit for **\$12 per vehicle, per day**.

MEET AND GREET

On Tuesday evening from 6:30-10:30 pm, gather at Newsom Hall for games, ice breakers, and fun organized by the Colorado 4-H State Officers Team.

PHOTOS

Check out the Photo Booth in the lobby of Summit Hall! This will be a nice backdrop for a county delegation photo or for an informal photo anytime during conference. Bring your camera or smart phone and be sure all delegates and adult advisors are present for your delegation photo!! Each county group is responsible for taking their own group photo and sharing it with all members and with their county 4-H Office staff. Youth are encouraged to use the conference hashtag to share with other conference participants: **#co4Hconf2017**.

ALL-CONFERENCE COMMUNITY SERVICE OPPORTUNITY

Do you have gently used stuffed animals that you just don't know what to do with? This year at conference, we will be collecting stuffed animals to support "Stuffed Animals for Emergencies" www.stuffedanimalsforemergencies.org. New and gently used stuffed animals are redistributed to Police, Fire & Rescue, Ambulance Services, Children's Services, Hospitals, Life Flight, and other emergency organizations. These emergency organizations use the stuffed animals to ease the children's nerves and calm their fears during traumatic, emotional, and transitional situations.

CELL PHONES AND ELECTRONICS

In consideration of your roommate and to ensure a good night's sleep, please do not use your cell phone or other electronics between 11:30 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. Cell phones must be turned off during assemblies, workshops and other planned group activities.

COLORADO 4-H DRESS CODE



The following dress has been developed to prevent participants from becoming offended or uncomfortable during any 4-H events or activities. If you choose to dress inappropriately, you will be asked to change. Planning ahead and packing appropriately will save yourself the inconvenience of changing your attire during the 4-H event or activity and ensure that you contribute to a pleasant 4-H atmosphere. The following dress code will be enforced for all individuals attending 4-H events and activities, including chaperones.

1. Clothing: All clothing shall be neat, clean, acceptable in repair and appearance, and shall be worn within the bounds of decency and good taste as appropriate for 4-H events and activities.
2. Articles of clothing which display profanity, products, or slogans which promote tobacco, alcohol, drugs, sex or are in any other way distracting, are prohibited.
3. Excessively baggy or tight clothing which advertises gang symbols or affiliation is prohibited.
4. Items of clothing which expose bare midriffs, bare chests, undergarments, or that are transparent (see-through) are prohibited. Tank tops with straps wider than one inch are permitted. Spaghetti straps, shirts which expose a bare back, halter tops, and tube tops are prohibited.
5. Shorts must be mid-thigh length. No cut-off shorts or shorts-shorts allowed.
6. Swimming (For all water recreation): Swimsuits for men: swim trunks only (no shorts, cut-off pants or Speedos). Swimsuits for women: One-piece suits recommended, however, two-piece suits are allowed as long as they are modestly cut. No string, thong or crochet suits will be allowed. Swimsuits may only be worn while in the swimming pool area.
7. Hats need to be removed for meetings, workshops, meals, and other times when asked to remove them.
8. Shoes must be worn at all times deemed appropriate.

All chaperones are asked to make sure that their county delegation is meeting the dress code.

- Fans
- Expensive items such as jewelry, cameras or electronic equipment that might get lost/stolen

COLORADO 4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT CODE OF CONDUCT

In preparation for conference, please review the Colorado 4-H Youth Development Code of Conduct below that you and your parent/guardian read and agreed to when you registered for 4-H this year in 4HOnline. Note: A Signed Code of Conduct is located in 4HOnline, under profile information section.

4-H members, leaders, parents, and other adults participating in 4-H programs will:

1. Adhere to program rules, curfews, dress codes, policies, and rules of the facility being used.
2. Conduct themselves in a courteous, respectful manner, use appropriate language, exhibit good sportsmanship, and act as positive role models.
3. Abstain from illegal behaviors, use of alcohol, marijuana, illegal or illicit drugs, and tobacco during 4-H events and activities.
4. Fully participate in scheduled activities.
5. Respect others’ property and privacy rights.
6. Respect the rights and authority of parents, leaders and Extension Agents.
7. Abstain from abuse (physical and/or verbal) and harassment.
8. Accept personal responsibility for behavior including any financial damage.
9. Be responsible for any financial damage caused by inappropriate behavior.
10. Adhere to principles and rules of safety.

Consequences for violating any part of this code of conduct may include, but are not limited to: removal from participation in the event in which the code of conduct has been violated (at the individual’s expense); sanctions on participating in future 4-H events; forfeiture of financial support for the event; removal from offices held, etc.

Behavior outside of 4-H activities can affect “member in good standing” or “volunteer in good standing” status.

It is the responsibility of all program participants to reinforce the code of conduct and intervene when necessary to enforce the rules.

RESIDENCE HALL RULES

1. Lights-out time is 11 p.m. on Tuesday, and 11:30 p.m. on Wednesday and Thursday. All residents must be in their rooms. Adults will enforce curfew.
2. Keep your room clean! Put trash and recyclables in appropriate containers.
3. Be completely dressed in hallways at all times.
4. Keep rooms locked for your personal safety. Carry your keys with you when you leave.
5. Do not use cell phones between 11:30 p.m. and 6 a.m. except for emergencies.
6. Close window blinds when dressing and undressing so others cannot see into your room.
7. Do not open room windows except in an emergency. If a window is opened or things are dropped from windows, ALL occupants of that room will be sent home at their own expense.
8. Furniture and bedding must remain in their original locations. You will be charged for missing/damaged furniture.
9. Boys and girls are not permitted to visit each other inside residence rooms at any time.
10. Smoking, illegal drug or alcohol use is not allowed inside any residence hall.

320 MAPPING YOUR WAY TO BETTER COMMUNITIES

STEM / CEL

This is an all-day workshop. Register for 320, 420, and 520. Did you know that using GPS to collect information about problems and needs can be the first step to making positive changes in your community? Ever think that "crowd-sourcing" input from your friends and neighbors can provide information that when placed on a map, has the power to explain to community leaders exactly where changes need to happen. Are you wondering what job skills you should be learning to make you super-employable? Join 4-H and the CSU Geospatial Centroid and use your own technology (i.e., cell phones) to collect data on issues around campus, learn to build story maps so you can present your findings and then share your work with campus professionals who use geospatial technology every day.
